

## Mr. G. Brian Greenwood

Pupil 1934-1945 Governor 1959-1969 Chairman of Governors 1969-2009 Honorary Life President 2009-2021

As the school finished for the summer term in July 2021, the whole school community was saddened to hear that Mr Brian Greenwood had passed away. He held the role of Honorary Life President for his invaluable contributions to Woodhouse Grove School. On Saturday 2nd October the school was honoured to host a Thanksgiving Service in the school Chapel for all his family, friends and the Grove community.

The Service was carried out according to Brian's wishes; David Greenwood (Brian's son) welcomed the congregation, the Headmaster wrote the following welcome and delivered a reading and former Headmaster, Mr David Humphreys delivered a poignant and reflective eulogy.


'Anyone who knows anything about Woodhouse Grove will know that the School was very much Brian's 'kingdom'. The School's motto, Bone et Fidelis – Good and Faithful – is taken from the New Testament's Parable of the Talents and reminds us that we all have gifts and that we need to work hard to improve and develop these gifts because one day we will have to give account for what we have done with the opportunities, talents and abilities we have





been given. Brian certainly used his extensive talents freely and unstintingly to promote the School and enjoyed a continuous association with Woodhouse Grove for more than 85 years.

He was the youngest pupil ever to join the School upon the opening of Brontë House in 1934 and left the Grove in 1945 having been its longest serving pupil – 11 years and one term. From 1945, Brian was an active member of the Old Grovian Association and



served two terms of office as its Chairman. Throughout the 1970s and 1980s, he was the School's lacrosse coach and referee having formed the Old Grovian Lacrosse Club in the 1950s with his former school friends.

In 1959, Brian was invited to join the School's Board of Governors before becoming Vice-Chairman in 1964. In 1969, he succeeded Sir George Martin to become Chairman of Governors, a position he held until 2009. He holds the distinction of being the longest serving Chairman of Governors to have held office in any Public School. Upon his retirement from the Board, Brian became the School's very first Honorary President, a role he held for the rest of his remarkable life.

Brian has left Woodhouse Grove with a rich legacy that will long outlive the decades he spent building it up. No one can deny the fact that he was a 'good and faithful' servant who will be sorely missed by all members, past and present, of the School community.

On a personal note, it was a great pleasure and a privilege to have known Brian for over 35 years – as a pupil and, more recently, as Headmaster of the School he loved so much and supported so fervently.'

## Joe Bedford's RFU Council Election

I was elected by the Rugby Union clubs in Yorkshire to represent them on the RFU Council in March 2021. The RFU Council governs the game of Rugby Union in England and there are currently 61 elected members from varying Constituent Bodies (CBs) throughout the country. Yorkshire provides two representatives as it is such a large CB. I have been elected for a three-year term and the most you can do is three terms of three years, so nine in total. My term officially began in August 2021, and I have so far attended two formal RFU Council meetings at Twickenham in October and November. I also attended the England v South Africa match on the Saturday after the November meeting, which culminated in the RFU's 150th Anniversary Dinner.





I feel very privileged to be in this position and it is great to be able to give back to the game that has given me so much as a player and a coach. I feel I can provide a perspective from the grassroots and within the dressing rooms of school, club, and representative rugby within Yorkshire. As part of the role, I am a member of the Yorkshire RFU committee and I attend bi-monthly committee meetings to provide feedback from the RFU, help to make decisions and support the game in Yorkshire.

Within the RFU Council, I have attended several different sub-committee meetings which govern certain aspects of the game. So far, I have attended the Education and Age Grade and Game Development groups, with a view to joining one of them in 2022. I have also been part of a working group looking at player return within the men's community game and how we can boost playing numbers and availability post-covid. We provided feedback to council on how to move forward with this and the RFU will implement measures in the new year to help improve the outlook.

I am really looking forward to the next few years on council and hopefully I can play a small part in shaping the game of Rugby Union in the future.

# Moh exceeds expectations in his first McLaren year

Old Grovian, Moh Ritson successfully completed his A-levels in the first year of the pandemic. The Covid chaos also forced a sabbatical from his career in motorsport. However, he came back fighting in 2021, returning to professional racing for one of Britain's fastest growing race teams, Paddock Motorsport, in their McLaren 570S.

Moh received instruction from McLaren pro-driver, Euan Hankey and the team is run by ex-IndyCar and 24hr Le Mans winner, Martin Plowman, alongside Strictly Come Dancing winner and Emmerdale star. Kelvin Fletcher.

Moh's season started 'virtually' with a range of E-sports competitions. Moh and his team achieved virtual podiums in the 24hr Le Mans & 6hr Nurburgring, and a few months later, they achieved an overall victory in the virtual 24hr Daytona race.

On his first race weekend of actual racing, Moh achieved a 2nd place finish in the McLaren. As the season progressed, Moh achieved a total of 3 wins, 8 podiums and 1 pole position, which allowed the team to secure 2nd place in the GT Cup Championship at the end of the year.

"To achieve my first official win in my car racing career this year was amazing. It was even more satisfying to reach this success given the high level of competitive racing."

This collection of results earned Moh an invitation to compete for a place on the exclusive McLaren Driver Development Programme. Moh was one of 14 drivers selected from around the world to undergo 3 days of rigorous testing under the close eye of McLaren professionals. The assessment included time spent with key motorsport personnel, including the CEO of McLaren, a panel interview, an F1 standard fitness test, simulator test and two days of on-track racing challenges.

"The assessments were some of the hardest I have ever experienced but simultaneously thoroughly enjoyable and a priceless learning curve for me."

In 2022, Moh will be competing in the McLaren again in the same championship, with the goal of winning it this time.

Although I left WGS in 1977, it would be true to say that I owe everything I would become to WGS - though specifically from my very last week when I watched a television documentary on the Battle of the Somme, where I first heard the story of the Bradford Pals! Never being taught anything at the Grove about the Great War, and the internet then not even being a dream, it was a long and very difficult road back then to somehow acquire a working knowledge of the story of the Great War. However, my time at WGS had given me the determination to succeed, and my knowledge became sufficient to meet and talk with some of Bradford's surviving WW1 veterans.

I have guided the school's annual History trip to the WW1 battlefields in the past. One year this involved the stories of John and Jasper Whitehead, named on the WGS memorial. I had been researching them for their relative, not connected to the school, who came along on the trip too. John (Capt. 'Jack' Whitehead, RFA) once had a memorial cross placed in a cemetery near Ypres by his men; a cross that had since been lost. The family had a photograph of the original cross; this photograph not only enabled me to make an exact copy of the original - but also to determine its exact original location. On the battlefields trip, past and present Grovians placed that new cross for Jack, our fellow Grovian, in its original location once more. This cross is still carefully tended and looked after at a location within the Ypres Salient. By way of thanks, members of the present Garnett/Whitehead family initiated the annual 'Whitehead Trophy' for current WGS pupils, a prize given to the pupil producing the best research report on a family member who served in the Great War, the legacy of a Battlefield Tour I previously led for them.

Having spent over 40 years studying the Great War, with an emphasis on Bradford's soldiers, I realised that I could not tell their stories, especially that of the Bradford Pals, forever. I contacted

Donna with the idea of making a film at the school telling the story of the Bradford Pals whom had so influenced my life when 17 at WGS. The story I put together is new, from my own research, and tells their story in a way you will not find in a published book. The film involves the Headmaster, staff and pupils of WGS telling the story of the Bradford Pals that I had written for them. Underlying all, the story of 16/772 Cpl Allen Lee who joined the Pals in September 1914, went to Egypt with them in 1915 and was wounded in the 1st Bradford Pals attack on Serre on July 1, 1916. Lee would return to France to the 2nd Bradford Pals and ultimately to the Leeds Pals, with whom he was captured in April 1918. Allen Lee died in July in the prison camp hospital, a fact not communicated to his wife, Lily, until a plain postcard came through her letter-box from Geneva, literally as the church bells were ringing to celebrate the Armistice. Her husband would not be coming home.

Three of the pupils involved in the film were past winners of the Whitehead Trophy, and those taking part each read their individual parts in chapel - but they did not do this in order, and no one heard the whole. Between each part are photographs and objects that once belonged to the Bradford Pals that I have collected over the years, the participants handle and look at them - but maybe not fully understand their significance to the story. One of the final photographs used in the film is of 2/Lt John H.Robinson of the 1st Bradford Pals who attended Woodhouse Grove and was killed in action at Serre on July 1. His father, JH Robinson Snr, was President of Bradford Chamber of Commerce and was instrumental in the formation of the Bradford Pals battalion in 1914.

The overall film will be both a fine tribute to the Bradford Pals and my legacy to the school for all the school gave me back then and in more recent years. The film is planned to be shown every five years.



Unlike that young man all those years ago completely shell-shocked in his final days at the Grove - no one again will leave the Grove without at least hearing the powerful story of the Bradford Pals!

#### Andrew Smith (82-95)

In September I was elected as Lord Mayor of Westminster. As a ceremonial first citizen, my role is to be a representative voice of the city to the community and voluntary sectors, business, and the diplomatic community. As part of the role, I serve as the Deputy High Steward of Westminster Abbey. This means that I outrank everyone apart from the Royal Family when I attend events. It is a strange feeling to see the Prime Minister standing up when I have entered the Abbey for services marking national events!

My aim during my term in office is to help support the idea of civic engagement and the importance of a sense of belonging to a place and its history. Clearly Westminster has a long and fascinating history which is so entwined with our national life, but it also has a very strong community life. My focus will be to support those organisations which support community engagement and give back to the communities they operate in.

Since I moved to Westminster nearly 20 years ago it has always frustrated and saddened me that, despite Westminster having some of the wealthiest areas in the world, it also suffers from a significant amount of poverty. The charity that I am supporting as Lord Mayor is a small Westminster based one called Westminster Befriend a



Family, which helps families and young people facing social isolation and deprivation to broaden their horizons through education and employment.

#### Dino Kania (84-89)

The T&A wrote an article on me with reference to the companies that I own, in-particular my favourite, Classic Car Lab. The article ran before I contracted Covid, during which I spent several weeks in ICU. I am still in recovery and I thought this may bring a smile to somebody's face, as I am very grateful to the school - and in particular to Mr D Miller - who was the Head at the time, for giving me the tools that I need to tackle life. I was at Woodhouse Grove at the same time as one of your Governors, Dr K Johall, who is still a dear friend of mine.



#### Nick Wheelhouse (85-92)

Whilst at The Grove it was Doc Wilson who persuaded me to go and study Biological Science at University. I did my undergraduate degree in Newcastle and, after finishing a PhD in Aberdeen, moved to Edinburgh where I held research positions at the University of Edinburgh and then a Scottish Government research institute working on infectious diseases of livestock, several of which can cause disease in humans (zoonoses).

I've been working at Edinburgh Napier since 2016, where I've been lecturing on the ways zoonotic diseases emerge and perhaps there's a few of our graduates who now realise that their lecturers did know a thing or two! I'm now an Associate Professor in Microbiology and Deputy Director of the Centre of Biomedical and Global Health within Edinburgh Napier, managing projects within the UK and Sub-Saharan Africa.

#### Julia Day (92-97)

I've been studying part time at the University of Exeter (whilst teaching English at a vocational college in Norway), and recently completed my MEd (Master of Education) in TESOL, graduating with distinction. #### Lucy Holloway (93-07, st16-)

In August (on her 30th birthday) Lucy Hollway swam the length of Windermere, 10.5 miles. Lucy raised £1370 for Kirkwood Hospice, which holds a special place in her heart as her Grandmother passed away there and she has previously volunteered in their charity shop.

Lucy said "I have always been a keen swimmer but swimming the 10.5 mile lake, the largest natural lake in England, was an enormous challenge and I was both extremely excited and apprehensive about it. I actually swam it in 6 hours and 33 minutes and felt incredibly proud of myself and delighted with all the support I received. Best 30th birthday ever!"



#### Will Watson (93-03)

As part of my training to be a cardiologist, I took time away from front line medicine to do a PhD at the University of Oxford - or a DPhil as they call it there. I spent just over three years researching new treatments for weak hearts, learning research skills and cutting edge techniques at the Oxford Centre for Magnetic Resonance Research. I finally submitted my thesis in August and after a successful viva was awarded the degree! So, I can now chart my academic trajectory as Brontë House, Woodhouse Grove, University of St Andrews, University of Cambridge and University of Oxford!

In April last year, I had to put my PhD on hold as the NHS was calling for extra help. I volunteered to work in intensive care as I had some experience at registrar level but little could prepare me for what would happen next. As numbers ramped up, I traded recruiting patients to our MRI based heart failure project for 13 hour shifts in the ICU for a long five months. We did what we could but it was a scary time; we lost many patients while fearing for our own health. As



time has gone on, treatments and decisions about how we treat Covid have evolved and we slowly got better at it. Things settled, although again in early 2021 I was called back for a second time to help out. As I write this, I am wondering if it will happen again, and things look very uncertain.

Now I am back in Cambridge, training at Royal Papworth Hospital, the heart and lung center. I am hoping to take up an appointment as a consultant in heart transplantation in a few years' time, although the past couple of years have shown us that it is never easy to know what the future holds.

#### Mary Greaves - Former School Governor

A party was held at the Chevin Country Club and Spa to celebrate the birthday of centenarian Mary Greaves. The party was attended by the current Head of Governors Alan Wintersgill along with other past governors as well as many friends and family. Mary was born in the west of Scotland, went to the University of Edinburgh and was then directed to Crompton Parkinsons, Guiseley, during the Second World War, later working at James Ives. She then remained in Ilkley where she raised three children. Mary was the first woman to join the governing board at The Grove, and held the position for a number of years as well as being a Justice of the Peace. She has been happily retired for many years.

#### Jack Baxter (39-47)

Informed by his nephew Keith Baxter

Jack Baxter has died, aged 92. His parents separated when he was five. In the mid 1930s he and his brother (my father) were placed in care at National Children's Homes as their mother – pre welfare state – was unable to afford their upkeep. Jack was found to be academically able and was given a scholarship to Woodhouse Grove School. He enjoyed a full school life of learning, socialising and sports. He matriculated in 1947 and was sent to Kenya for his national service, where he worked in the Royal Corps of Signals.

Returning to the UK, he trained as a teacher at Westminster College, specialising in French. He spent a year working as a teaching assistant in Cognac, France then secured a teaching job in his original home town of Southend on Sea, Essex. He taught for 33 years at Belfairs High School for Boys initially teaching French, but soon specialising in English. Among the thousands he must have taught was Steven Cottrell, the current Archbishop of York. Jack organised cricket teams, chess and skiing trips to the continent. Socially he was involved with the Methodist Church and amateur dramatics.

On retirement he became involved in family history research, at first looking at his own ancestry, but then transcribing Essex parish records from before the era of censuses. With this data he compiled lists of christenings, marriages and deaths that were published and referred to by genealogists the world over. He was honoured as a Fellow of the Society of Genealogists.

In later life he lived alone, independently and contentedly, in Hadleigh, Essex. He continued to receive Old Grovian magazines and enjoyed reading about the school and former scholars.

Informed by his daughter Angela Hammond



Gordon always remembered his time at Woodhouse Grove with great fondness and returned to school often. He represented the OGs at cricket. He won School Colours for Rugby, Cricket and Athletics; but not swimming! In his early twenties he became a double international representing Sierra Leone at Rugby and Cricket. #### David Hall (st84-90)

David Hall died in the early Spring of 2021 after several months of incapacity. His last preaching appointment was at a Harvest Festival at Horbury in September 2020. His memorial service was at Trinity Methodist Church, Castleford on November 3rd, on what would have been his 80th Birthday. Sadly, his wife was in hospital at the time after two falls. To June, Simon and Beth we send our deepest sympathy in their sad loss.

David came to WGS in 1984 following the ministry of Brian Coleman. He was previously Chaplin at Ashville College and moved on in 1990 to Ripon Grammar School where he eventually became Deputy Head under Martin Pearman.

He was a fine teacher and was well respected by staff and pupils. He was also a good "Common Room Man" and offered sound advice to all who sought it. His lessons were well prepared and direct in approach. As a minister he was essentially a High Church Wesleyan, an exemplary preacher and pastor; everything was well delivered for he was a man of experience, broad knowledge and a deep thinker, but never dull. His rich sense of humour was always evident.

He was popular not only in schools but in the churches where he ministered from Blackburn to London, Essex and Yorkshire. His death is a loss to his family, his former colleagues and pupils and to the Methodism. We are thankful for his example, his care and friendship for over forty years. Xaipete.

## Hugh Myers (30-35)

Before his passing at the end of 2021, Hugh's nephew Austin had been in contact with the WGS Foundation to share with us a summary of his uncle's life since leaving Woodhouse Grove...

An update on the oldest Old Grovian Hugh Myers (30-35) aged 104, from his nephew Austin.

Hugh was fortunate enough to be sent to Woodhouse Grove as a boarder. He excelled at art and sports, was in the Orchestra and Choir, he attained the status of prefect and also his school colours for the first XV... He still resents the fact that because he was a conscientious objector that he was only awarded 2nd class colours instead of 1st class. (I'm not certain that this was the case but he always maintained it to be so).

He went to London in wartime and worked in the east end at Kingsley Hall in Bow, he always maintained that he was subjected to more warfare than the majority of those on the frontline. He was a very keen youth worker and a Senior Scout taking charge of large groups of under privileged youths to camps far and wide, especially in Scandinavian countries Sweden and Denmark... He eventually joined the family business in Keighley as a draper, he carried on with this well into his 70's. He was a very keen gardener and in order to fulfill his lifelong ambition designed his own home in 1962, where he began his mammoth task to layout his garden. My twin brother and I were regular visitors and helped him where we could, shifting huge amounts of soil and stone. He rewarded us with holidaving in Scotland and The New Forest annually. He was a very cultured man and introduced both my brother and I to many skills relating to outdoor activities, music, reading and horticulture. We recently came across a short video of Ghandi's visit to Kingsley Hall in Bow, where uncle Hugh was a volunteer and helped with the youth work. He also appears on the video which supports his claim that he helped to look after Ghandi.

I went on to gain a diploma of which he was extremely proud. We wandered around his garden in later years, which he tended well into his late nineties. He eventually succumbed to support in a care home in Silsden where he remains to this day. I have visited my uncle Hugh in Silsden. He is as stoic as ever and at 104 fighting the good fight. My brother and I have been sorting through his home as his return is more than unlikely.

His parting shot to me and my wife after the visit was so endearing. "We have a long association, don't we Lad." We hugged and he laughed. Of course he's very frail but his mind when stimulated is amazing.




## **Digital Archive Launches**

One day in the autumn term of 1947 aged nine, I can remember sitting cross-legged on the polished parquet floor in the hall at Brontë House with other new boys having a singing lesson with Ernest Moxon who, with his wife's assistance, had been master in charge during the recent War years and now, semi-retired, had returned to help with music lessons.

We had sung several times up and down the musical scale to the words "Fish and chips," when Mr Moxon paused, looked at me, smiled and said that a good substitute would be for us all to sing "Roger Davy". I suppose that is my initial memory of the important part music would play in my life at the Grove. Ten years later my final musical memory from school days was solo singing the first few bars of David McCarthy's moving 'Nunc Dimittis' with the Chapel choir at its premier on my last Sunday evening in July 1957.

I was never an instrumental musician but always enjoyed singing at the daily Morning Prayers in the School Room where the Staff Room is now situated. The Head would choose an appropriate hymn to be sung by the whole school including all the 'gowned' staff. My first year at the upper school was the last year of the then headmaster C W Towlson who had been in post since 1922. Mr Towlson had a fine tenor voice and conducted local choral societies. It was not unusual for him to interrupt the hymn and correct our efforts by singing a particular line of music with which we were not achieving his high standards. I can fully understand that subsequent Heads have not been eager to follow his example!

After three years as a day-boy in 'Atkinson' I joined 'Vinter' in 1952. I don't know if the tradition still exists but then all new boys to the House, at the end of their first term, had to stand on the lockers in the middle of New North dorm and sing a song to everyone else. This, for most youngsters, was a traumatic experience - particularly if the odd soft slipper was thrown at them during their performance - but once achieved, you were accepted as a fully fledged member of the House.

Nowadays, with the advantage of the Performing Arts Centre led by Philip Tedd, music is as ever an integral part of life for present day Grovians. Though we had fewer facilities, nevertheless every week we sang at six morning Assemblies, and we all sang at least ten hymns in Chapel every Sunday during our regular morning and evening visits. We just accepted that as part of our weekly routine.....together with dutifully donating, at the Sunday morning service, a threepenny-bit coin into the 'collection'. The coins were collected and recycled each week and the appropriate amount was always added to our termly account.

Piano lessons took place in one of the practice rooms going up the stairs opposite the old chemistry lab. I can still hear the cacophony of sound from perhaps six pianos all being played at the same time..... how did they get all those heavy instruments up that winding staircase?

The Music Society thrived on Sunday evenings for recitals and talks and there were occasional visits to St George's Hall in Bradford, perhaps to hear the BBC Symphony Orchestra with Sir Malcom



Sargent, or the Halle in Harrogate. We were accompanied by Ken Pelmear, our Cornish music master or David McCarthy. Once Ken Pelmear became quite giddy when he was overcome by the rake of the seating high up in the 'gods' at St George's and had to retire to the foyer to come round! Another time, my friend Malcolm Overend and I waited at the stage door before he arrived to get Sir Malcolm's autograph on a scrap of notebook paper and he expressed surprise that we wanted his signature before the concert.

Dark autumn and winter Monday evenings were enhanced in the Memorial Hall by the weekly visits of our ballroom dancing teacher Dorothy Braybrooks and her three young lady helpers. Oh the joy of the 78 rpm brittle vinyl records of Victor Silvester's strict tempo orchestra accompanying at least forty of us, being mostly smart and clean hand-washed, learning the waltz, quickstep, slow foxtrot and the tango and having the dizzy thrill of tentatively putting an inexperienced arm around a young lady's waist, often for the first time...Mind you, it was totally different learning the Charleston by holding on to a canvas-seated tubular steel chair..... but my 'reverse-turn' is still something to admire!

There is so much of the music we heard at the Grove which now generates a lifetime of memories. The 'Football Song', "The autumn term has passed again with heat and frost and drizzling rain...", the Prize Day Hymn, "O Holy Father, Lord of life and God of love" and the incomparable "Xaipete!" which was first heard and sung at the end of Prize Day in the summer of 1891, now one hundred and thirty years ago. When young ladies were welcomed to the Grove, John Brodwell and I, after great discussion, submitted to the Governors and the Headmaster that the second line in the last verse should be amended to "Distance from her 'kin' can sever" instead of "sons".

Those words with the wonderful melodies all composed by Frederick 'Freddie' James have resonated with all Grovians down the years.... but especially 'Xaipete!'. F C Pritchard once said "That School Song has been sung on countless Grovian occasions, for once sung, it goes on singing itself!".

'Word of joy with kindness spoken,

Telling of a bond unbroken....'XAIPETE!

### Reflections

One of the outcomes of living in the context of a pandemic has reinforced for me the belief that spirituality plays a significant role in our wellbeing.

We have lived with increased levels of uncertainty for a couple of years now and during this time I have observed the link between spirituality and positive outcomes for young people and communities, particularly in the areas of wellbeing.

Many of the Woodhouse Grove community have shared with me during my time at school that it is being connected to something outside of the chaos of the world that helps them understand themselves and gives them purpose and a sense of belonging.

One of the ways we enable our young people to nurture their spirituality and connect with their own inner wisdom is through our gathering together in Chapel each week. We always begin with some silence and think about the situations in our world and in our lives where we long to find peace. They learn to listen to the stillness and discover the importance of forgiveness. They are encouraged to model integrity, respect, and inclusion and foster gratitude. They are taught interdependence, self-awareness and most importantly love.

Perhaps the greatest challenge we face in education today is the negative impact the uncertainty, isolation and fear of recent years has had on the wellbeing of our children and young people. For that reason, I believe that in addition to promoting the intellectual, physical, social, and emotional wellbeing of students we need to continue equipping them with the opportunities and resources to nurture their spiritual wellbeing.



I read somewhere that the definition for the word 'equipping' is "to supply or furnish with intellectual, emotional or spiritual essentials." It comes from the verb equip which comes from an old French word équiper which means to 'fit out a ship' ready for it to be put out to sea. Equipping our students with the knowledge that their lives are of value, that they are both part of and participate in a bigger story, I hope will give them the strength, resilience, and resourcefulness to navigate calm and choppy seas.

In the words of Father Richard Rohr, "A sign of emotional and spiritual health is when one can both give and receive in equal measure."

#### **Cavernoma Society**

I am fundraiser for The Cavernoma Society, Cavernoma is a rare disorder only researched at this moment in time in the USA. The Cavernoma Society Charity offer care, therapy, support, and education of specialist U.K Neurologists and Neurosurgeons. Cavernomas are vascular malformations in the brain. Their walls are thin and due to blood flow they can end up leaking blood which causes brain hemorrhages, strokes, cognitive impairment, seizures, vision and hearing loss, vertigo and even the inability to walk and talk.

I set up a just giving page to support the Charity in 2020, as the cause is close to my heart and this year I also plan to run the London Half Marathon to raise money for the charity.





## NORMAN EWART STRAFFORD (1889-1957)

WGS Music Master 1912-29

In November 2021, David Whithorn (70-77) made the school aware of the sale of the war medal of Norman Ewart Strafford, a former music master at WGS (1912-29). His medal, along with official copies of various documents, plus his 14 page service war record were purchased by the school in December 2021. There is scope for much further research here as Norman did not die in the War, but became a Sergeant and he had a prolific career afterwards as an accomplished professional musician.

Norman was a former music master at WGS (1912-29), who lived in school in Grove Cottage. He was also the organist both at Leeds Holy Trinity church (1929-50) and Hull City Hall at the time of the organ's rebuild in 1951, as well as being a minor composer. He was a noted professional musician with the Leeds Philharmonic and Choral Societies. He also conducted the Calverley Choral Society and Hull Choral Union. As well as composing anthems and songs, Strafford published one organ piece – Barcarolle in 1913.

His wife, Maud Isobel Strafford, also lived in school and was the first female teacher who took over teaching his students when he went to war. Sadly, she was 'removed' from these roles when he returned.

Norman enlisted on 11 December 1915. He was called up and attested at Leeds on 11 April 1916. He joined the 21st Battalion West Yorkshire and after training he served in France and Flanders and was made Sergeant until he was discharged from the West Yorkshire Regiment on 14 February 1919. He passed away at Whitby, Yorkshire in 1957.

Norman was the recipient of the WW1 British medal to the 21st Battalion West Yorkshire regiment (Leeds). Upon issue, Norman returned his British War medal for amendment as it had been incorrectly impressed as W.E STAFFORD instead of N.E STRAFFORD. For some reason though, he did not return his Victory medal, which remains, as issued. His service number and medal issue cards confirm that it was incorrectly issued.

Further research on Norman will continue . . . . watch this space for more information as additional information is gleaned!! His medal and war records will be stored for posterity and kept within the school archives.

## **School News**







Students involved in our Green Grove Riverbank project have been working hard this term and have cleared a large amount of the invasive Himalayan Balsam weed from the banks of the Aire. The student pioneers learned about the damage it does and how to remove it. The area has suffered from significant flood damage in recent years and a Tesco Community Grant awarded for this project will help to fund more beneficial planting on the riverbank, such as willow and fruit trees, which can improve natural flood resistance.

### **Fencing Club**

With its reintroduction to the school last year, fencing club has grown from strength to strength and an average of 30 pupils from Years 7, 8 and 9 now attend each week. Three pupils also attended an extra training session held by the Northern Sports Academy Fencing Club and trained with University of Leeds and Harrogate fencing club. Our Year 8 and 9 fencers benefit from the support and advice from Kira Grahamslaw, Year 10, who recently competed at the Cadet Epee tournament in Serbia. The first target tournament for our WGS fencers is The Yorkshire County Championships on 26th February 2022.



#### **New Outdoor Nets**

Work has started on the new outdoor cricket net project, which is scheduled to be completed in time for the 2022 season. The new 4 lane net facility will provide a high quality practice area for all of our cricketers. The winter cricket programme will commence in January, including sessions for boys and girls of all year groups. This year we have our fingers crossed for a full Summer of cricket.



## **National Cross-Country Finals**

The Grove's cross-country squad made school history this term when all four teams qualified for the National Final of the English Schools' Athletics Association's Cross-Country Cup.

The squad had to travel to Newquay, Cornwall but the long journey did not quell their enthusiasm and the Sunday morning barefoot jog on the beach and fun in the waves made it all worthwhile.
