RESULTS

Results are consistently good:

In 2023, 30% achieved Grades 8 or 9 at GCSE with 92% achieving grade 4 or above.



TOPICS COVERED IN Y7, Y8 AND Y9

We study history chronologically:

In **Y7** we begin by looking at the skills required to be a Historian. We focus on the Romans, Saxons, Vikings and British History from 1066 to 1485.



In **Y8** we focus on the years 1485 – 1750 with particular reference to the Tudor and Stuart dynasties. A special focus is given to the reign of Henry VIII and to the causes, events and consequences of the English Civil War.



In **Y9** we look at the years 1750 – 1945. We look at how Britain changed in this period with special focus on the Industrial and medical revolutions, leading up to looking at the outbreak and events of the First World War. We finish with a thematic study of the British Empire as a

force for good and evil.



THE IMPORTANCE OF STUDYING HISTORY

How else can you make sense of the present unless you have a good understanding of the past?

It develops the skills of questioning and assessing arguments and evidence needed for good citizenship.

THE NATURE AND FORMAT OF LESSONS

All students are taught in form groups. There are 3 x 55 minute lessons (Yr7 and Yr8) and 4 x 55 minute lessons for Yr9 with an average of one prep each fortnight. Lessons involve a variety of methodology to include: research, source analysis, extended writing, note-making, interactivity, discussion and group presentations.

CO-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

We have an escalating programme of co-curricular trips available across the key stages beginning with a theatre group visit for Year 7 and an English Civil War workshop visit for Year 8 to the Royal Armouries.





The annual WW1 Battlefields trip for Year 9 usually takes place at Easter and covers numerous historic sites and museums. For key stage 4 and 5 students, we run a trip to Berlin and Krakow/Auschwitz every two years.

We have a weekly Current Affairs Club for Years 7 to 9 students which encourages a different focus to supplement what is covered in class.

We also have enrichment opportunities for exam group pupils in Key Stage 4 and 5, and run a GCSE mentor system.
