OG Rugby Sevens Report



The end of the 21 / 22 season brought a close to 15 years of Old Grovians Rugby in the Yorkshire leagues competing as a 15 a side team. After a period of reflection, a small group decided to try to see if there was still interest in playing but as a touring 7s team instead of a full XV side.

We are very pleased to say that the interest was overwhelming and resulted in the team making their debut in the summer at the Jungle 7s hosted at West Park Rugby Club in Leeds. Three teams were entered into the competition, one in each of the following categories; Elite, Open and Social. The Open and the Social teams won the plate in their categories and the Elite team, having beaten the Army in the last play of the game in the semi-final, lost in the final by 2 points to a touring Fijian team (that had 5 full internationals in their team!). The Club went on to enter a few more 7s tournaments, winning at Otley after beating the world famous 7s team 'Samurai' in the final, and then reaching the final at a tournament at Ilkley Rugby Club. We are delighted to share that over 55 former pupils represented the OGs over these three tournaments, including 5 former 1st XV Captains.

The money the team raised through these tournaments was donated to the school and has been used to purchase a video camera to film games and has contributed to the new electronic scoreboard.

The future seems bright for the OG 7s. For the 2024 season we have already been invited to play in Melrose 7s, Scotland in their Invitational Tournament, which is a huge privilege. In addition to this, we will play two local tournaments at West Park Rugby Club and Ilkley Rugby Club before venturing further afield to London. The grand finale will be taking two teams to Dubai at the end of 2024 to enter the famous Dubai 7s Tournament. We will enter teams in the International Open and the Social Tournament. We are hoping to build and be even more successful on the pitch and hopefully raise more money off the pitch."

First Grovian at The King's Coronation

We were delighted and proud to watch Old Grovian, General the Lord Houghton of Richmond, carry part of His Majesty's Regalia to the altar for the Coronation Service on Saturday 6th May 2023. An incredible achievement to be part of this momentous occasion.

The David McCarthy Theatre (st53-92)



On Thursday 30th March 2023, at the end of the Spring Term Concert, The Grove Theatre was officially renamed "The McCarthy Theatre". For older generations of Grovians, David McCarthy requires no introduction; however, for those joining the school in the 30 years that have passed since his retirement.....

As the young Cambridge graduate stepped off the train at Apperley Bridge station in September 1953, little could he have imagined that the school where he was hoping to serve a mere one term's teaching practice would, 70 years later, be naming its theatre in his honour.

The then Headmaster, Dr Pritchard experienced first-hand David's passion for drama through their joint work producing "The Scottish Play"; and having successfully showcased a vast array of talents, David commenced a full-time post at the Grove as teacher of English and Assistant House Master in Vinter House. The rest as the saying goes, "is history"!

Throughout his career at the Grove, David's approach was unique, contrasting with the traditional dry, taciturn approach associated with boarding schools and schoolmasters of this period. His list of achievements and posts he held remains beyond compare. His length of service (39 years) is in itself a great testament, but these do not do justice to the quality of his work or the fondness, affection and respect in which he was held by pupils, colleagues and parents.

The 1992 edition of "The Grovian" magazine contained over four pages of coverage of David's 39 years of service and reminds us of the gala week celebrating David's retirement, which culminated in an end of term concert held in the gym of that time, this being the very same facility, redeveloped and repurposed, which today constitutes "The McCarthy Theatre".

Guest of honour, of course, at the End of Term Easter Concert (2023) David McCarthy, accompanied by his wife Liz, and one of three stepdaughters, Louise (nee Ambler) and 2 grandchildren. After an informal pre-event welcome from one of his former pupils and fellow "Vinterite" James Lockwood, at a small gathering in the Rawson Room, David responded in his own inimitable, humorous, self-deprecating style, showing himself still to be the master of the "mot juste". Later he modestly acknowledged a moving ovation received from the packed theatre, a number of whom would, of course, be too young to know about why this honour was being bestowed on this still handsome, upright gentleman approaching his 92nd year.

My words cannot do justice to his impact on the school, but his ethos and approach should be what we seek to emulate and ensure remain embedded in our culture. In his role as House Master and Second Master he sought to inculcate an attitude among pupils and staff which I believe in so many ways encapsulates his immeasurable influence as more than academic teacher, musician and sports coach.

As we seek to continue maintaining a kind and happy school where pupils feel safe and valued, his influence remains firmly with us today.

"Woodhouse Grove has been fortunate in the last 100 years to have had many long serving members of staff who have given a significant portion of their working lives to the school. None though has been more committed than David McCarthy who gave us all his working life and looks set to give a large part of his retirement. The Governors are profoundly grateful for all he has done for the school.

He is a cultured man with a love of literature in all its forms. This love quickly communicated itself to his pupils, and many of my generation of Grovians owe much of their introduction to poetry and prose to him."

David McCarthy served the school in a far greater number of ways than any other member of staff; coach of every cricket and rugby team; regular umpire; tireless referee, and later secretary, selector and chairman of Yorkshire 16 Group Rugby; Business Manager of the Canadian Rugby Tour; Convenor of Old Grovian teams; Assistant Secretary of the Old Grovians; Editor of The Grovian; House Tutor in three different houses; Housemaster of Vinter; Teacher of English, Latin, Music, Religious Studies, General Studies, and latterly Linguistics; Chapel Organist; Head of English; Director of Music; and Second Master.

Above all, David McCarthy is a quintessential Christian servant, bone et fidelis, who has unstintingly given his formidable array of talents to his pupils, to his players of both sport and music, to his school and to his church, following the example of Johann Sebastian Bach-Ad Mairorem Dei Gloriam."

An Old Grovian's reflection...

Streaming means something different now from when I was at school. Then, it meant sorting wheat from chaff, or boys from ... other boys. My year's intake was large enough to have three parallel forms. Previously boys had progressed through 1 to 5A but now they switched to the initial letters of the school's name. I was allocated to 1W. There was a 1G, and also 1S. And so, things progressed until we'd taken our O-levels in 5W, G and S.

On the first day of the first term of our first year, some of the boys knew each other from their joint time at Brontë, but I'd come from a state junior school and everything was a bit new to me.

The curriculum included academic subjects. These real thinking subjects, like maths, English, French, Latin and the likes, sooner or later saw the complement re-apportioned into sets ... C, B and A.

So ubiquitous were they that the initial W, G and S sub-apportionment soon paled into insignificance. Boarders had their house common rooms and, for the rest of their scholastic existence, mixed with who they got along with. Dayboys returned home at the day's end. But, as a form, we rarely saw one another once morning registration had been completed.

I was in C-set games, whose streaming was solely done for the purpose of picking the Under-13s side. Having cherry-picked the best rugger players for that purpose, come the summer term, they were occasionally at a loss to get A-set rugby players to know their silly-mid-off from their googlies. The A-set games/C-set maths partnering was something I, therefore, didn't share and I instead basked in the obscurity of C-set games coupled with A-set pretty much everything else.

The next target was to get A-grade exam results in A-set whatever, and this (or a very commendable B) and the greatest hopes of course resided in the A-set. However, in one subject, we did actually sit all together as form 1W, 2W, 3W and, finally, 4W right the way through to O-level: scripture.

Not a career subject qualitate qua, but, then again, modern languages aside, what at school level is? The fundaments of what I've deployed as professional skills in adulthood were mostly learned in adulthood; because, contrary to what we learn in school, fundaments are not building blocks. Rather, they are what a subject boils down to. And any chemist will tell you that what goes in at the start of an experiment is a far cry from what the experiment boils down to as its end result. What scripture boils down to is perhaps less relevant in terms of professional education. It's what it boils down to in the individual that matters. To some, that's a graded certificate; in others, the stuff of life itself. Streaming would never alter that. Besides which, how could they tell a group of youngsters that some know God very well and others ... won't make the grade?



Boarders in the Sunday suits

These few words are not just to remind those Grovians who shared the life of the School with me from the late 1940's to the late 1950's but hopefully they may interest a younger generation too. Sadly now a reducing number of my contemporaries will remember the Grove as it was in 'our day' and if you have not returned for some time I urge you to do so and you will find a school with most of the buildings we knew still there but the whole co-ed estate now enhanced with modern facilities of the highest quality and a tangible vibrant atmosphere and a continuing caring ethos.

Until the modern bottom drive was built to the sports complex some years ago, the only way to enter the school was down the back drive via the narrow entrance next to the Queens Hotel and alongside one of the lodges which face on to the busy Apperley Lane. There is still the drive to the front of the school but that way then was strictly 'out of bounds'. To attend the Chapel every Sunday morning and evening we walked the familiar way but prefects were allowed to use the rising path around the Mound. The original wrought iron gates to the front drive were taken away during the '39 -'45 war until the present ones were given in 1960 by his family, as a memorial to G R Holt who had come to the Grove in 1899 and later for many years he was a very supportive Governor.

In our day, and I don't want this to sound like a Hovis advertisement, we had to walk down the drive past the 'San' and then by the now built-on laundry field where generations of Grovian scouts practiced wood crafts and learnt camping skills then under the friendly encouragement of Lindsay Makinson, the scout leader, and senior resident and art master.

Buses carrying teams home from 'away' matches emptied at the top of the drive and it was always exciting to hear the 'school shout' as the members entered the playground to signal a victory or if we were all in the Dining Hall, from the end of the corridor just outside the Head's study. "Who are we, who are we, we are the Grove boys, Grove boys, Grove boys, we make no noise, no noise, no noise, who are, who are are!"

During frosty and snowy days in the winter months an ice slide would often be made which extended the full length of the playground and perhaps thirty or more intrepid Grovians would hurtle down at once, often ending up in a tangled heap at the bottom end before they rushed back to have another go. I don't remember anyone breaking a limb. I suspect 'health and safety' concerns may now restrict that exciting 'sport'.

The main access to the school was off the playground and through the then Covered Shed passing the 'backs', that less than salubrious but necessary school facility, and so into the Quad. On laundry days, perhaps a dozen wicker baskets would be stored in the Shed awaiting collection. The robust, plain speaking physics teacher and rugby coach 'Willy' Windle, used to park his car in there and on one occasion as he was setting off home to Timble he found that all the baskets had been piled all around his car so that you couldn't see it. It would be insensitive to record his verbal comments!

The Shed also gave you access to the Memorial Hall which has now been incorporated into the English department. The Hall, with its shining parquet floor and windows opening on to the Quad, was used for exams and important school events such as Prize Day and school plays. Once a year a school dance was held there which was the culmination of the regular ballroom dancing classes held weekly in the winter terms. With some gentle encouragement from a few house prefects the floor on those occasions was polished by perhaps ten juniors kneeling in a long line across the room each armed with a cloth and dollops of red floor polish, moving slowly forward rubbing vigorously. Perhaps it was an example of Grove 'character building' but I remember the ultimate shiny surface being quite lethal but no doubt helped to impress the many young lady partners from the Dorothy Braybrooks dancing school in Bradford with the dexterity of our reverse turns!

The Memorial Hall was used for many talks and events and I remember all of us boarders watching Laurence Olivier's film of 'Pride and Prejudice' there in silence because Ronald Bolt, senior maths teacher and projectionist, could not make the sound track work. 'Ron' also showed us regularly, his favourite Marx Brother's films. In the Memorial Hall we acted in annual school plays and it was quite natural that female characters would be played by boys.

In no way was the Grove anything like Dotheboys Hall, in that we never went hungry but the menu did not vary very much and even now I rarely eat cornflakes as they were then served daily for breakfast together with sliced bread, butter and jam, and quite often fried bread on top of a layer of baked beans served in oval metal dishes and we would bring in brown and tomato sauce and cheese slices to enhance our meal. Rabbit pie with thick gravy and an ample pastry crust was another favourite. Of course those were the days, not too long after the war, when many items were still 'on ration'. If you were lucky you could sometimes buy fish and chips at Greengates or visit the small cafes down at the Bridge or up in Little London or risk being really 'out of bounds' by getting a bus from Rawdon as far as Harry Ramsden's restaurant at White Cross.

As 'boarders' on Sundays we wore 'Marlborough' black jackets and striped grey trousers, or grey woollen suits with a white shirt and a black tie and in the afternoon sitting at our desks in the old School room, we would dutifully write our weekly letter home. We had one official bath a week, mine was in usually tepid water in the Basement, a long way from Vinter New North dorm. Daily we learnt our lessons, some more conscientiously than others, including some taught in the 'Womery' classroom with its tiered floor, half way up Old North stairs overlooking the playground. We did PE and games, some of us again somewhat reluctantly, with John Bairstow but in the end most of us emerged at eighteen as grateful Grovians, grateful for what the school had offered us, grateful for creating life-long friendships and grateful for being able to cope with the world outside the Grove 'bubble'.

I have been very grateful too to the Head, James Lockwood, and his helpful staff for allowing a small plaque to be placed near the 'old' organ in the School chapel to the memory of Kenneth Pelmear who was music master and a junior rugby coach in the school from 1949 to 1959.

Kenneth left the Grove to become music master at Truro School for another twenty years. Through our close Cornish connections, my family and I kept in contact with Ken who became a Bard of the Duchy for writing histories of Cornish rugby and particularly for composing and arranging many popular pieces with a Cornish flavour for brass bands and choirs. A reducing number of us former Grove choristers remember Ken with some affection as organist and choir master.

Kenneth died in 1995 and he would have celebrated his centenary on the 1st October 2023.





WHERE ARE OUR GROVIANS NOW...

David Santwyk-Anderson (48-53)

"Having been a pupil at Brontë House and at WGS during the late '40s and early '50s I transferred to St Peter's, York in 1953 and left there after 'A' levels in 1957. I now live in Australia enjoying retirement at 84 years young. I set off for South Africa in 1957 to work as an underground official at the President Steyn Gold Mine in Welkom in the Orange Free State. My work as a technician took me to Uganda and Kenya where I stayed for 8 or 9 years. Following my return to the UK I was employed as a Development Test Engineer on the Concorde project at Hawker Siddeley Dynamics in Hatfield (where among others I met the famed 'Barnes Wallace'the bouncing bomb man). I then moved on to working as a research engineer in the Plessey organisation providing mechanical engineering support for essentially Military research projects which took me to Atlanta, USA. During this time together they were blessed with three children, Karen, Richard and Pippa.






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Ryan Young (06-13)





I think I was Born for Retirement

David McCarthy (st53-92)

Why did I spend most of my life (so far!) as a teacher? I suppose there must have been other careers that at various stages I considered more enticing, more exciting – engine-driver, bus-conductor, fighter pilot, concert pianist, but when it came down to it, towards the end of my school days, I decided to become a teacher. On reflection I suppose it must have been because of the charisma and example of so many remarkable teachers – in my infants' school in the Welsh mining village where I was born, in the junior school in North Staffordshire, the grammar schools in Newcastle-under-Lyme and Wakefield through which I progressed and then drifted blissfully through university into the Department of Education.

And so it was I joined the staff at Woodhouse Grove. At the time I had no thoughts of the future, other than preparing lessons for the following day – making sure I had enough material or quickness of wit to see me through the forty-minute lessons – and perhaps coaching the odd bit of rugby and cricket. I certainly never contemplated being anchored there for the next thirty-or-so years. Then, when the inevitable retirement arrived it was simply a case of floating from one delightful state to another.



Retirement (which is what we have to call it) has been a lengthy sequence of enriching circumstances, the best of which has to be my deciding to marry Liz, and thus acquiring not only a wonderful wife but also three matchless daughters (all Grovians, as it happens) and a most affable Labrador, Henry.

For some years, walking Henry ensured I too had plenty of exercise as he and I roamed the terrain bordering Skipton, including the towpath on the Liverpool-Leeds canal. In between times I fulfilled the office of organist at the parish church and regurgitated much of the music I had performed in the Grove chapel. Stepping down from the parish church duties (into another "retirement") I then had the pleasure of playing for services at a variety of local churches – Embsay, Linton, Brierfield. We then "relocated" to Todmorden – to the surprise of many - and settled happily in Calderdale. I had clung to the hope that if ever I moved from one district to another, I would be able to "retire" from being a church organist, even a lowly "organist of last resort", but the ecclesiastical world seems plagued with vacancies and despondent appeals for church organists. In Todmorden and Hebden Bridge the sirens blared again and, in such situations, "No", however short a word, is impossible to say.

As a matter of fact, Calderdale is by no means short of culture, of music and musicians. It is, in truth, a musically rich area where we have enjoyed all kinds of musical events, choral and instrumental. Venturing further afield we go to places like Burnley and Halifax (seriously!) and on special occasions as far as London to La Boheme at the Royal Opera House and jazz at legendary Ronny Scott's Club. Inevitably, from these heights I then descend to my own more modest efforts at the piano in our sitting-room, to strive with pieces from my gradually diminishing repertoire. The situation regains a truer perspective when I attend recitals at venues within range to be suitably chastened and thrilled by the brilliance of international celebrities, in other words, "proper pianists".

A benefit of retirement is that it allows one to travel, if not wherever but (more or less) whenever one likes, unfettered, of course, by school affairs; and we have taken advantage by exploring the continent and flying to outposts of commonwealth as far away as Canada and New Zealand, not to mention a bizarre

Las Vegas-cum-California aberration. On our travels we have admired astonishing natural sights, 'tis true, but we always return reassured that our homely British landscapes, many within a stone's-throw-and-a-bit, are still our favourite.

Nevertheless, the journeys that have given as much pleasure as any have been, by kind invitation, my visits to The Grove, to marvel at its expansion, to renew long-standing friendships and associations, and to refresh countless recollections of times and characters that bring my days such unmerited enrichment.

 \cdot Integrated technology for the live streaming of topical issues.


Elements of the space will have a much more corporate feel, preparing our students for life after Woodhouse Grove.

Almost 1 km2 of solar panels, installed last Autumn, have cut school electricity consumption by 33% in May 2023 compared to May 2022; even dropping to zero consumption at times throughout the month.

Recent investment in an automated swimming pool cover is also starting to have an impact on reducing heating costs in the pool area.
