School Update

A Year of Adjustment and Resolve

The 2024-25 academic year was one of the most challenging in recent memory. The Chancellor's announcement on 29 July 2024, confirming the implementation of VAT on Independent school fees from 01 January 2025, fundamentally altered the financial landscape for the sector. While the decision had long been rumoured, the earlier-than-expected start date was both unexpected and unwelcome, arriving months ahead of even our most pessimistic planning assumptions.

The Government's stated rationale – that the policy would fund the recruitment of 6,500 new teachers for state schools – has been widely debated. While few would question the urgent need for better funded state education, many remain unconvinced that this measure will achieve the desired outcome. As Sir Keir Starmer himself described, this was a "difficult decision, not an ideological one." Yet for schools like ours, the implications are substantial and immediate. The policy risks undermining the diversity, accessibility and partnership work that the independent sector brings to British education as a whole.

Nevertheless, Woodhouse Grove has met this challenge with characteristic pragmatism and foresight. For several years we had been preparing for the eventuality of VAT on fees, engaging in careful financial modelling, operational streamlining and strategic investment to ensure resilience. The development of additional on-site revenue streams, including expanded facility hire, improved conferencing provision and increased lettings activity, continues to strengthen the School's ability to weather such headwinds. These initiatives not only protect financial stability but also enrich the experience of our pupils and extend our reach within the community.

Further complicating the picture were the increased Employer National Insurance contributions and lowering of the contribution thresholds, adding yet more financial strain on independent schools nationwide. The sector faces what can only be described as a period of turbulence. Yet the Grove remains well positioned — agile, disciplined and grounded in clear purpose. As one military strategist once put it, "No plan survives contact with the enemy," and the measure of a good plan is how well it adapts. Our careful planning, I am pleased to say, continues to prove robust and responsive.

Enrolment and Academic Success

Against this uncertain backdrop, enrolment held up remarkably well, with the School meeting its recruitment targets. Brontë House continued to demonstrate reassuring stability, even showing growth in certain year groups despite the regional decline in primary-aged children. This speaks



volumes for the School's enduring reputation for academic excellence, pastoral strength, and allround educational provision.

Our A-level results last summer were strong, aligning closely with projections and securing university places for the vast majority of Year 13 students at their first-choice institutions. Once again, our pupils proved that academic ambition, supported by dedicated teaching, yields consistently impressive outcomes.

Meanwhile, on a national level, the contrast in university access between regions remains deeply concerning. UCAS data reported by The Times revealed that while nearly 70% of school leavers in Wimbledon progressed to university last year, only 13% did so in Barrow-in-Furness. Such disparities serve as a stark reminder of the enduring challenges in educational equity and of the crucial role that schools like ours play in ensuring opportunity and aspiration remain alive across the country.

ISC Celebrating Partnerships

The Independent Schools Council's "Celebrating Partnerships" publication continues to be an inspiring showcase of collaboration between the independent and state sectors. The 2025 edition once again highlighted how schools are working to address Government education priorities through shared teacher training, access to music and the arts, community sports initiatives and crucial mental health programmes.

It was gratifying to see Woodhouse Grove's partnership with One In A Million Free School (OIAMFS) once again recognised within the booklet, a testament to our sustained commitment to meaningful partnership work. These collaborations remain an essential part of who we are – contributing to the broader educational ecosystem and demonstrating the social value of independent education in tangible, impactful ways.

School Charity Committee

Our charitable endeavours last year continued to flourish under the leadership of our Sixth Form Charity Prefects, both drawn from our Boarding community. Their creativity, energy and empathy reinvigorated our fundraising initiatives, embedding charitable engagement more deeply within school life.

Guided by Mrs Nulty and Rev Drost, the return of whole school voting for charity selection gave students a genuine voice in shaping our giving priorities. Last year's chosen causes reflected a balance of local, national and international impact – from our enduring partnerships with



Candlelighters and Bradford North Foodbank, to St Gemma's Hospice, Cancer Research UK and Save the Children.

A particular highlight was welcoming representatives from St Gemma's Hospice, including Old Grovian David Walker, who returned to share his experiences as a volunteer. The week of Chapel assemblies they led was both moving and motivating, reinforcing for pupils the importance of service and empathy. The total sums raised last year were substantial, but more significant still was the spirit of generosity that underpinned every event.

Achievements Throughout the Course of the Year

The Grove's co-curricular life continues to thrive, with achievements across every discipline reflecting the talent and dedication of our students and staff alike.

- Culture Week returned for its second year and was again a resounding success. The EDI Talent Show proved a standout highlight, featuring everything from classical musicians to comedians, dancers, and even a magician.
- Our mathematicians broke previous records in the UKMT Intermediate Maths Challenge, securing 10 Gold, 20 Silver and 26 Bronze awards, with six students qualifying for the next stage.
- For the first time, we entered 21 pupils into the UK Linguistics Olympiad, winning both Team and Individual Silver and Bronze awards placing several students in the top 15% nationwide.
- February saw 62 students embark on a Football Tour to Milan, including a visit to the San Siro Stadium to watch AC Milan play live a truly unforgettable experience.
- At Easter over 100 pupils enjoyed our annual Ski Trip to Italy.
- On the Rugby field, the U14s reached the last 16 of the National School Sports Magazine Cup, while the 1st VII triumphed at multiple 7s tournaments including Scarborough, Ampleforth and Mount St Mary's, and reached the semi-finals of both the North of England and Rosslyn Park National Plate competitions.
- Netball continues to excel our U15A team reached the National Cup semi-finals, while the
 U13s captured the Sisters in Sport National Plate title. The U14s and 2nd VII also performed
 brilliantly in national competitions, and the 1st VII ended their season on a high by winning the
 Queen Margaret's Invitational.
- In Football, our U14 girls reached the ISFA U15 National Shield semi-final and the 1st XI boys reached the National Bowl quarter-final, losing only one of their 11 matches all season.
- The U13 girls' Cricket team retained their title as West Yorkshire Indoor Champions and narrowly missed out on the county crown at Headingley.



- Our Cross Country runners once again impressed, with a record-breaking 203 pupils
 participating in the Inter-House event, and the Senior Boys reaching the English Schools'
 National Cup final.
- The Golf team progressed to the Independent Schools' Regional Plate Final, and our Climbing teams competed more widely than ever before.
- The summer brought a fitting finale, as our Senior Cricketers toured Barbados and St Lucia, combining sport and culture in a once-in-a-lifetime experience.

The Performing Arts programme continues to flourish:

- The Autumn Term production of Chicago: Teen Edition was a triumph of professionalism and creativity.
- The Junior School's Mary Poppins Jr in the Spring Term charmed audiences with its energy and polish.

Staffing Updates

As ever, the end of the academic year brought with it some heartfelt farewells. Each departing colleague left behind a legacy of dedication and care that has shaped countless pupils' lives.

We extended particular thanks to Ms Strachan, Mr Fernandez and Miss Bastin for their passion and creativity across their subjects. We also said farewell to Ms Evers, whose seven years of teaching English, Media and Drama has inspired so many students to pursue the arts with confidence and flair.

After 17 years of devoted service Mr Bean, left The Grove for a new chapter outside teaching – a tremendous loss to the profession and our community alike. Mrs Richardson moved on after nine years in Biology and Science leadership to take up a Head of Faculty role. Mrs Shirley Crawford, after five years in Girls' Boarding and a decade prior in our Medical Centre, departed with our deepest gratitude for her exceptional kindness and care. Mr King, former Director of Sport and Assistant Head, departed after eight years of outstanding leadership, heading to a new adventure with his family in Dubai.

Four long-serving colleagues retired in the summer, collectively giving 96 years of dedicated service:

Their contribution to every aspect of school life – academic, pastoral and co-curricular – cannot be overstated and they all embodied the ethos of Woodhouse Grove.

Among support staff, we also said a fond farewells to our Catering Manager, Franco Caroleo, whose warmth and humour made the dining hall a daily highlight, and Lindsey McManus, whose nine years in Marketing were marked by creativity, professionalism and unwavering positivity.

Conclusion

Education policy may change, and the financial environment may grow tougher, but the core purpose of Woodhouse Grove remains unchanged: to nurture young people of intellect, character and kindness.

The introduction of VAT has undeniably tested the resilience of our sector, but it has also reaffirmed our sense of purpose. Through prudent management, thoughtful planning and a collective commitment to our values, The Grove continues not merely to survive but to thrive.

We will remain defined not by the policies imposed upon us, but by the difference we make every single day – the curiosity sparked in classrooms, the courage built on sports fields, the friendships forged in boarding houses and the compassion demonstrated through service to others.

The landscape ahead may shift, but our compass is steady. Woodhouse Grove will continue to adapt, to innovate, and above all, to provide an education that inspires young people to be the very best they can be.

Thank you for your continued interest, support and commitment to Woodhouse Grove. We are proud of our shared heritage and look forward to welcoming the Old Grovian community to future Alumni events, gatherings and celebrations.

Southerns Report

Particular thanks of course to the students whose energy and potential was at times quite overwhelming, reminding all the Trustees of exactly what we miss about teaching – young people who surprise, inspire and delight.

Foundation Report

1. Expanding Fundraising Initiatives

The past twelve months have seen significant progress in the growth and diversification of fundraising and development activity through the Foundation Office.

Donations and Financial Overview

Between November 2024 and October 2025, the Foundation received total donations of over £10,500, reflecting continued support from across the Grovian community.

Online Giving and Regular Donations

The online giving page went live on the school website on 26 November 2024, providing a simple and accessible way for members of the Grovian community to contribute to the Foundation. Since its launch, two new regular monthly donors have signed up via the platform, and several single donations have also been received - marking an encouraging start for this new digital giving initiative.

Old Grovian Gift Shop

The Old Grovian Gift Shop launched on 26 February 2025, generating a total revenue of £4,164.99 to date. This figure includes pre-orders for the Old Grovian Rugby Jersey, a popular new addition to the merchandise range. A new Old Grovian merchandise and archive display has been allocated a display cabinet in the school, located at the bottom of the Sports Hall corridor/McCarthy Theatre stairs. This dedicated space celebrates Grovian heritage while promoting engagement with the Foundation's work.

The Grove Business Directory

September 2025 saw the successful launch of The Grove Business Directory, with 12 founding members. The launch event took place on 18 September in the new Sixth Form Building, attended by the Headmaster, Foundation Trustees, staff and directory members.

Each business contributes an annual membership fee, which goes directly to the Foundation's Bursary Fund, offering a sustainable source of support. The next event for the directory, a Breakfast Network Meeting, is scheduled for March 2026, followed by a 2026 Summer evening



networking event to continue to build professional connections within the Grovian business community.

Annual Giving and Legacy Programme

December 2025 will mark the launch of the Annual Giving Campaign, which will incorporate a Regular Giving Programme and the relaunch of the Fidelis Legacy Programme. Groundwork also continues to cultivate potential major donor gifts.

2. Strengthening Alumni Relations

Strengthening alumni relations remains a core focus for the Old Grovian Association (OGA) and Foundation. Engagement activity has continued to expand, both in-person and digitally, with a range of new and established initiatives.

Events and Reunions

Over the past year, the OGA has hosted a varied calendar of events, including:

- Annual Autumn Reunion at The Grove 10 November 2024
- London Reunion 24 April 2025
- OGA Golf Day Sunday 4 May 2025
- OGA Family Fun Day Sunday 29 June 2025
- New Termly Coffee Mornings at The Grove 18 March, 10 June, and 9 October 2025
- New Event for Recent Leavers: "Leavers 23, 24, 25" Thursday 28 August 2025

The Family Fun Day was a particular highlight, attracting Old Grovians of all ages, 2025 leavers and their families, current and former staff, and current families from The Grove, Brontë House, and Ashdown. This event continues to grow in scale and remains a key engagement and fundraising event for the Foundation.

In addition to hosted events, the Development Office has welcomed 85 Old Grovians, including two former staff members, back to school for guided tours.

New Engagement Initiative: The Year 7 and Old Grovian Letter Exchange

A new intergenerational engagement project, The Year 7 and Old Grovian Letter Exchange, was launched in Summer 2025. The initiative invited Old Grovians to sign up to receive a personal letter from a Year 7 student. The response was overwhelming, with 120 Old Grovians registering to



to take part. The project successfully connected current pupils with alumni across generations, fostering a deeper sense of belonging and community within the wider Grove family. OG letters to be presented to the students early December 2025.

Communications and Publications

The last twelve months have seen a strong emphasis on improving and diversifying alumni communications:

- Xaipete, the annual Old Grovian newsletter, was published in February 2026, resulting in a £500 donation from a postal subscriber following the inclusion of a new Foundation Donation Form and prepaid envelope.
- 'iNSIGHT', the new termly alumni newsletter, launched in Spring 2025. The Summer 2025 edition, sponsored by an Old Grovian, enabled 150 printed copies to be distributed and generated two donations to the Foundation.
- Grovian Giving brochure due for release December 2025. This brochure highlights the many ways Grovians, regardless of generation or gender, can give back and make a lasting impact.
- Social media expansion continues to build momentum:
 - Instagram account launched in February 2025
 - LinkedIn page affiliated with the Woodhouse Grove School profile, launched in January
 2025

- Email communications via the Old Grovian database continue to perform strongly, with an average open rate of 51.2% and an average click rate of 6.2%.
- A 99% sign-up rate was achieved among 2024/25 Year 13 leavers to receive OGA news via email a process now embedded as an annual tradition.

Grovian Voices Podcast

The Grovian Voices Podcast, launched in March 2025, has quickly become a standout initiative for digital engagement. With 2,861 downloads across 317 cities in 42 countries, the podcast has



successfully connected the Grovian community worldwide.

• Season 1: 15 episodes, Season 2: 4 episodes live

Guests include Old Grovians, former and current staff and current students.

The podcast has fostered meaningful relationships across the community, with multiple messages of positive feedback received from alumni, former staff and a former Headmaster.

Sixth Form and Alumni Engagement

Collaboration between the Development Office and the Sixth Form team continues to strengthen. Old Grovians are regularly invited back to school as guest speakers and to share career profiles, which are displayed in the new Sixth Form Building and on the secure digital platform for students.

In November 2025, the OG Ambassadors initiative will launch, enabling Sixth Form students to assist with school tours, events and future engagement ideas.

Archives and Heritage

The school archives represent an untapped but highly valued resource. Over the past year, selected archive materials have been featured at OGA events including Coffee Mornings and Reunions - to excellent reception. Plans for archive engagement events in 2026 are currently in development.

Optimising Donor Stewardship

Research is underway to recognise and honour donor contributions within the school through the creation of a Donor Wall recognition feature, celebrating the generosity and impact of those who support the Foundation.

Database and Systems Review

Following a thorough review of the alumni database provider, it was agreed to renew the three-year contract with Blackbaud, securing a favourable renewal price and ensuring continuity of data management and engagement systems.

Build Data & Reporting

The Development Office will continue to work closely with the Finance Team to monitor and report on income and Gift Aid, ensuring transparency and accuracy in financial reporting.



The Development Office continues to work astutely to optimise revenue streams and identify new opportunities for income generation, helping to mitigate the financial challenges faced by the school.

6. Priorities for 2025/26

Looking ahead, the Development Office will continue to build on the year's momentum, with key objectives including:

- Further strengthening alumni relations through targeted engagement and communication.
- The launch of the Annual Giving Campaign, including the Foundation's first Giving Day.
- Celebration of 100 years of the House System, incorporating recognition of donors and supporters.
- Publication of an Impact Report to share the tangible difference of philanthropic support.
