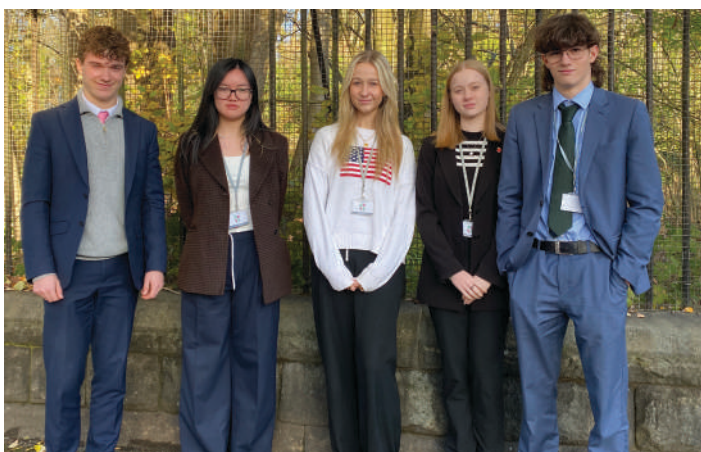
OG Sixth Form Ambassadors

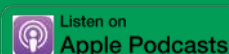

OG Sevens Rugby: A Season of Triumph, Talent and Tenacity

The 2025 OG Sevens season was nothing short of spectacular. Anyone following their Instagram couldn't help but be in awe of their success, driven by the perfect blend of seasoned veterans and hungry young talent.

Their campaign kicked off at Pocklington Sevens, where a healthy squad made an immediate impact, setting the tone with a strong opening win. Momentum continued at Kinsale 7s in Ireland, where 8 of the 12-strong squad were Old Grovians, leading the charge to another victory and proving that experience and youth could seamlessly combine for success.

May saw OG Sevens dominate Bournemouth 7s, entering two squads — Elite and Social — more silverware came home! Next up were the Eggchasers, where the Elite and U18 squads showcased resilience and skill. The Elite team emerged as Plate winners after a challenging group stage.

The season culminated in a remarkable trip to Dubai 7s, one of the world's biggest sevens tournaments. OG Sevens Netball: From Bold Idea to Dubai Champions

When OG Sevens first proposed creating a netball team for the Dubai 7s, excitement and panic hit in equal measure. Could a brand-new team really take on one of the world's biggest sporting festivals with no warm-up or trial run?

Months of planning, late nights and determination followed. A passionate group mapped out the team, secured sponsorship and navigated the complex Dubai 7s application process - with unwavering support from OG Sevens, especially Matt Gaffney and John Hinchliffe (82-94).

Thanks to main sponsor JWH Tanks and all our other supporters who backed us, the dream became reality. Kits arrived, training intensified and a squad of mentally tough players was ready. Nine of the ten players were Old Grovians and the team manager was an OG, giving the squad strong roots and shared history.

Arriving in Dubai brought heat and pressure, but the team's speed, cohesion and fearlessness shone through. Over two days, they dominated the group stages, winning every game, cheered on by OG Sevens rugby players.

Finals day tested them like never before, but they stayed composed and fought with heart. When the final whistle blew, they were crowned International Social Cup Champions - a bold idea turned historic achievement.

Thanks to our players, coach Georgie Thompson, supporters, OG Sevens and our sponsors, this journey turned a dream into triumph. As the team flew home, thoughts were already on next year and the future of OG Sevens Netball - proving this is just the beginning.

Music at The Grove – a retrospective view!

When I arrived at Brontë House in September 1947, as one of only a total of five day boys, the 'back drive', now the main entrance, was a muddy, overgrown track down to the back door which was overshadowed by a huge iron fire-escape. Once inside the house, a dark passage led past the kitchens to the classrooms and the entrance hall, and the splendid oak panelled and parquet-floored hall where morning assembly and weekly music and singing lessons took place.

Ernest Moxon, had been the 'strings' music teacher at The Grove since 1924 and in 1940 because most of the younger masters had been 'called up' into the Forces, he agreed to be the resident master-in-charge at Brontë House for another seven years with his wife as matron, coping with the privations of the war years. Both had just finally retired in 1947, but then Ernest remained as a part-time music master. In the school hall we learnt to sing up and down the scales, singing "Fish and chips, fish and chips, fish and chips" until one day to my embarrassment, Ernest – our teacher, realised that my name would be an ideal alternative, "Roger Davy, Roger Davy, Roger Davy!"

Arriving at The Grove two years later when my brother Peter was Head Pre, I soon got used to Morning Assembly in the old School Room, now the Staff Room, with its many rows of worn wooden desks, on which scores of the lids were carved with the initials of long-gone occupiers. The whole school would be there with the staff wearing their teaching gowns and each of us with a copy of the 1933 Methodist Hymn Book from which we sang a hymn accompanied on the black 'baby' grand piano by the newly appointed Cornish music master Ken Pelmeur. The then Headmaster Clifford Towlson (st1922-50) was in the last of his twenty-eight years as Head. He stood or sat at the equally imposing oak desk in front of the large centenary screen, now upstairs in the library, and led the assembly. He had a fine tenor singing voice and led various choral groups in the area, particularly in Pudsey where he continued to conduct the local society.

The volume of sound from the collective voices of more than three hundred boys and young men was always impressive, but in Towlson's time if he considered we were not singing to his satisfaction, he would stop us and correct our mistakes by singing the correct line himself, for all of us to repeat, if necessary several times. There was no apparent obligation for subsequent Grove Headmasters to emulate CWT's lead in this practice!

One of the disadvantages in our day at a single sex school but then accepted as completely normal, was that in plays the girls' or ladies' parts were always taken by boys. We didn't think it strange; it was just the way it was. One memorable occasion was when, as part of the Christmas Concert in 1950, Lindsay Makinson, the Art and senior resident master, produced G & S's 'Trial By Jury', and the Plaintiff 'bride' was played by Leslie Myers who was a regular award-winning boy soprano and who was supported by four attractive young 'lady' bridesmaids!

I do not know if the tradition, then recognised as a 'rite of passage' to become a fully accredited member of Vinter House, still exists, but for many years the custom was for every new House member, on the last night of their first term, to stand on the lockers in the middle of the senior New North dorm and sing a song to everyone in the House. Quite an ordeal for some but then quickly overcome by a sense of pride and achievement.

Nowadays the tradition could be enhanced with the addition of young ladies' voices!

Monday evenings in the Autumn and Spring terms in the Memorial Hall resounded to the music of strict tempo dance tunes, played on 78 rpm vinyl records, as perhaps forty of us learnt ballroom dancing under the cheerfully strict tuition of Dorothy Braybrooks, who had a dancing school on Manningham Lane in Bradford. With combed hair, clean hands and comparatively clean shoes we learnt the quickstep, foxtrot, tango, samba, rumba... and the Charleston, the latter by holding on to the back of a green metal tubular chair with its canvas seat, and 'winging' our feet about! The weekly bonus in those far-off days was the presence of three young ladies from Bradford Girls Grammar School who came to help us learn to dance, and for us particularly to enjoy the new experience of actually holding and dancing with a girl! At least two of my contemporaries eventually married young ladies whom they had first met in this way.

So, there was music to be heard most of the time in 'our' day, from portable radios, 'in dorm', under our blankets, late on Sunday nights when listening to 'Top Twenty' from Radio Luxembourg, and during the day the constant playing of five pianos and perhaps clarinets and a trumpet, in the practice rooms along the corridor just below the Art Room in what is now the Towlson Building. We also sang six days a week in morning assembly and as boarders always a total of ten hymns every Sunday on our morning and evening visits to the Chapel. Times have changed!

Those of us who have spent any length of time at The Grove will have nostalgic memories of at least one aspect of our lives there. Perhaps for some it will be a memorable game of rugby. Perhaps for others it could be the memories of house cricket matches played on the field in front of the School where strangely, two games were often played at the same time and where you risked life and limb if standing in the outfield with your back to the alternative game, but for me as being not too much of a sportsman, though I could run quite fast in House '7-a-sides', an on-going memory is of being in the school and chapel choirs accompanied initially by Ken Pelmear on the original pipe organ and later by David McCarthy. I well remember singing solo, the first few phrases of David's splendid 'Nunc Dimittis' at its premiere, just before I left, on my final Sunday evening in 1957 and on many occasions singing the school song 'Xaipete!' and at the end of the Autumn Term the Football Song.

"The Autumn Term has past again, With heat and frost and drizzling rain,

To mar the football sport...Play up Grove, Play up Grove, Play up Grove!"

Apart from the Football Song there are also the splendid words and music of the Prize Day Hymn of 1897 both of which were created through the joint talents of the former Head, Dr Arthur Vinter who provided the words, and his music master 'Freddie' James, who composed the music. They also produced the now sadly unheard Cricket and Lacrosse Songs.

The words for Xaipete! were actually translated from a Greek poem by the Rev Benjamin Hellier and given to his friend Freddie James to set to music. The resulting song had its first public performance at the end of Prize Day in 1891.

Whenever and wherever Grovians meet formally, the words and music of our school song will be sung and later repeated by every new generation. Then, those words and that special melody will always be securely fixed into the individual memories of Woodhouse Grove.

"Joyful word at parting spoken,
Be it to our friends a token,
Of a bond of love unbroken,
Xaipete! Xaipete!"

An Inspector Calls

In 1978, about six of us were studying for French A-levels. We had conversation classes with a French assistant, a student teacher. As part of his assessments, an inspector was sitting in with us this particular day.

At one point, we were having a bit of a laugh, and Jacques said that, if we were going to laugh, we should laugh in French, at which point I did my best hee-ghaw-hee-ghaw-hee-ghaw impression of Maurice Chevalier, clever Dick that I am.

The conversation turned towards a new, hitherto unheard-of subject: the environment. How remarkable it is in these modern days of climate change, global heating, plastics overproduction, waste sorting, PFASs and the rest, to think that these concerns have all arisen over the course of one man's lifetime, for in 1978 we barely knew what an environment was - literally, as what follows illustrates. The point was made by none other than our guest, the inspector.

I've never forgotten three things from that day: how to laugh in French; that why is both *pourquoi* and *la raison pour laquelle*; and the meaning of the French *la nature*. We say nature in English, but it's not intuitive, and the intuitive rendering can be elusive.

"Où est la nature ?" the inspector asked. Where is nature?

"C'est là, dehors," someone said. It's out there.

We sit by the Shipley to Leeds railway. If ever there was something that is not nature, it's the Shipley to Leeds railway. It deafened us as double-headed diesels chugged past. It came out of a tunnel that took five navvies' lives to build, through Apperley Bridge Station onto an

embankment that God never intended, even if the Midland Railway did, and crossed the Aire, in which leeches were the only lifeform.

The inspector gestured. "Où ça ? Là-dehors ? Vous croyez que cela, c'est la nature ?" A seminal moment. It dawned on me: for most of my life I've never truly experienced *la nature*. Maybe you have. Climbing in Wales (once the car park's out of view) or boating up the Amazon (with Belém way behind you) or trekking across the Sahara (without a Jeep). We're surrounded by natural products, natural wood and natural, healthy lifestyles but, from birth to death, we rarely actually experience nature itself, even if we talk about it all the time. Now even less so than in 1978.

We extract from nature and leave much destruction behind. We regard nature as the subjects of a painting might regard the world: stylised, marshalled by the artist's sense of composition, constrained within the frame, and hung on a wall to lend a pleasing allure to what would otherwise be a vegetal free-for-all.

He left a deep impression, decades before we could really understand what he was driving at, that inspector who called.

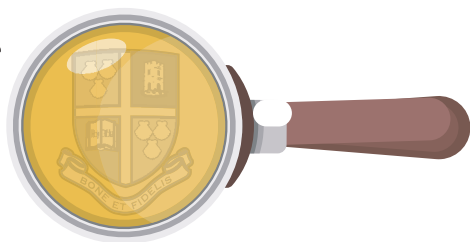


Becky Ives

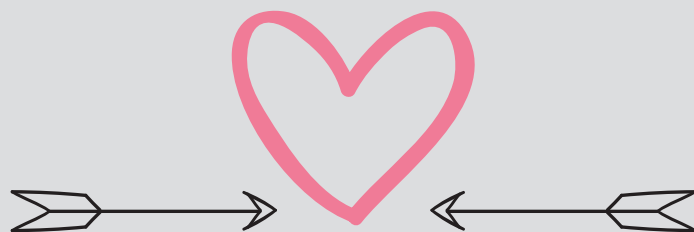

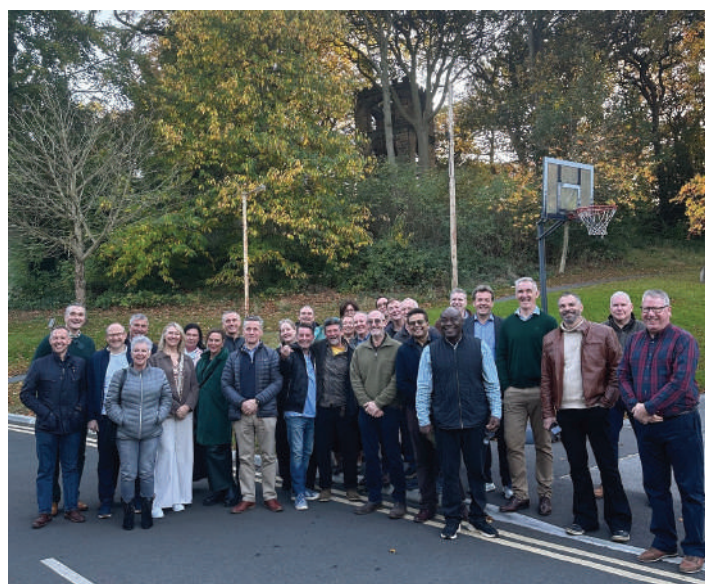


Class of 1983-88 Reunion

Obituaries

GEOFFREY NEWTON (38-47)

Informed by his daughter, Sarah Newton.

Geoff died on 13th March 2025 in the care home in Cambridge he'd moved into summer 2024. Making it to 95 was quite an achievement he never expected, and as he used to say, using a favourite sporting metaphor, he had good innings, and was content with that.

Dad loved his time as a boarder at the school, and we have heard many a story over the years of his time there, including life at Woodhouse Grove during wartime. He wrote an article several years ago about life in the wartime years, you may already have a copy of it. He loved the sports on offer at the school, particularly cricket and rugby. One year he won the overall sports award Victor Ludorum, which would in normal times have resulted in a special blazer. Unfortunately, due to the war there was no spare material for things like that, so he never got it. During a Grovian reunion in London in 2019, around the time of his 90th birthday, he told the story to the headmaster who was there as well. Shortly after that a sports winners blazer arrived in the post - to make up for the one he never had. I cannot tell you how much delight and pleasure this generous gift gave Dad. He wore it regularly with such pride and was always happy to tell the story of how he came by it.



ROBERT SMITHSON (63-70)

Informed by his sister, Eleanor Weetch.

Rob was a boarder in Southern House when Mr Makin was Housemaster. School and House Prefect. He was a keen rugby player and ran for the school in the 100 and 220 yds.

After school Rob went back to the family farm in north Nottinghamshire where he expanded the acreage and excelled as an agriculturalist. His farm was featured twice in the Yorkshire Post and his high standards in crop husbandry made him a leading seed grower. He became dedicated to the care of the land, flora, fauna and bird life, erecting huge numbers of bird boxes and making and maintaining ponds for insects encouraging others to do likewise.

With his wife he walked all the national ways of England, Scotland and Wales and did some walking with Chris Knee (63-70), a running friend from school. After leaving school he had many interests, particularly history and art and always regretted he didn't pay more attention at the time! Rob died of cancer on 30th January 2025.

My father, Chris Carter passed away on 20 November 2025, aged 82.

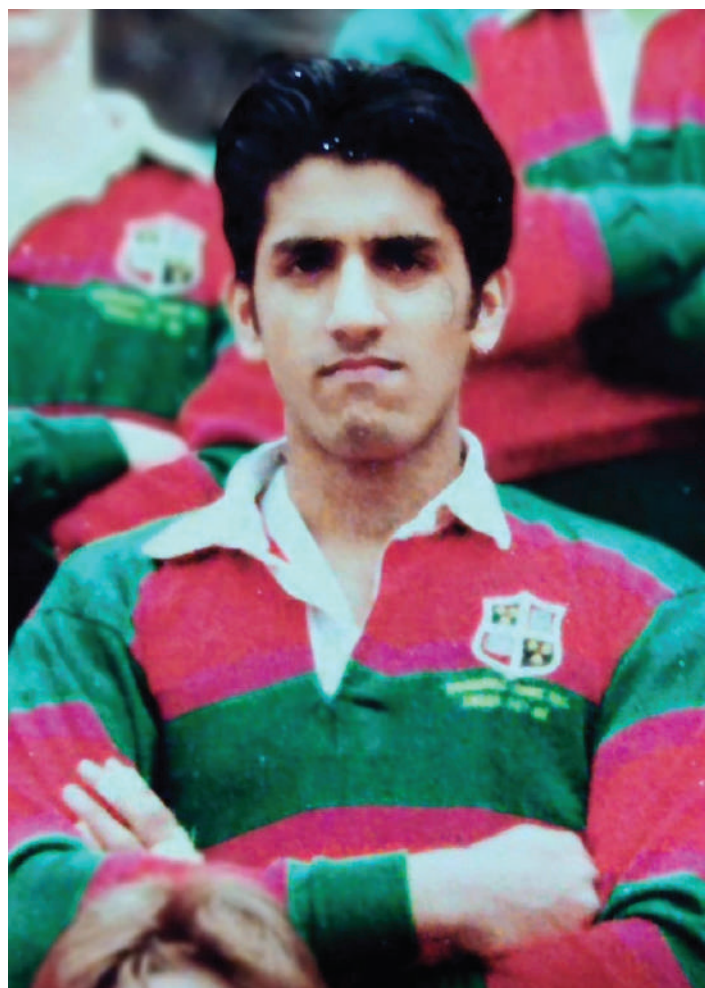
