> A very special element to the collaboration will see Woodhouse Grove award two full Sixth Form bursary places per annum to promising Y11 One in a Million Free School through its own Charitable Foundation which was set up to support and fund bursaries for pupils whose parents may not otherwise be able to afford the fees.

Mainly time for family and health; but also things I will not have to face again like endless e-mails and policy amendments, and paying through the nose for holidays in school holiday




What do you think you will miss most about Woodhouse Grove?

# Life on the right side of the Pennines!

We interviewed Dan King, Director of Sport to find out about his first year at The Grove.

What made you apply for the job at Woodhouse Grove?

The National reputation of the school in a variety of sports was one of the key reasons why I applied for the job, and on further investigation the outstanding sporting facilities that the school has to offer inspired me to want to work here.

#### How have you found your first year?

Rewarding, challenging, eye-opening, exhilarating! Every day is different and has different challenges, this is one of the things that I have really had to embrace this year. In particular it has been difficult working away from my young family who reside in Liverpool. I will definitely not miss the journeys up and down the M62 when we move onto school site in the summer.

#### What has surprised you most about the job?

The levels of commitment and motivation that all staff, pupils and parents have when it comes to co-curricular activities. I have been very lucky to inherit such a passionate staff team who are willing to commit their time to deliver sports and activities. Parents also have a major role to play in supporting practice sessions and fixtures, both after-school and at weekends.

#### What is your favourite thing about Woodhouse Grove?

Apart from the support I receive from colleagues throughout the school, it would have to be the fantastic array of food that we receive on a daily basis!

#### What have you enjoyed most about the job so far?

I have really enjoyed getting to know all the staff throughout school. In addition to the sports staff, I work closely with staff in grounds and estates, catering, medical, lettings and administration who are all so important in the day to day running of Woodhouse Grove, and without whom, we would not be able to deliver such an extensive co-curricular programme.

#### Any particularly funny moments or highlights so far?

My main memorable moment so far would have to be driving the U16 Netball team down to Stevenage to take part in the National Netball finals. From the 'Greatest Showman' sing-alongs, to the sub zero playing temperatures, to finishing 4th overall in the country it was a great day.

#### What are your key objectives going into your 2nd year at WGS?

Continue to create more opportunities for all pupils regardless of ability levels within the school. To use sport and physical activity as a tool to develop physical, social and mental well-being is a real priority of mine moving forward.

#### Maths Superstars

Over 50 students from top set Maths in Y9, Y10 and Y11 sat the Intermediate Maths Challenge this term. The pupils had to answer as many complex and challenging questions as they could in 1 hour. Our students performed very well with 6 pupils gaining Gold Certificates, 8 Silver certificates and 16 Bronze. We would like to congratulate Zhang Xiang and Luke Burke, both Y10, and Michael Cavaliere, Y11, who were all awarded Merit certificates for placing in the top 25% of participants in the next. more challenging Kangaroo round.

In addition, Y7 'maths superstar' Zaina Rajput beat 270 other young mathematicians and won 1st prize in the February Maths Challenge run by Leeds University.

# Performing at Crufts Amy Brook, Y12

Amy Brook, Y12 had an amazing experience when she qualified to perform at Crufts with her English springer spaniel, Bow. Amy and Bow have been competing in heelwork to music, informally known as dog dancing, for a year. Amy tells us more about it...

"I have entered two fun shows and four official Kennel Club shows and to qualify for the Young Kennel Club ring at Crufts, I had to keep a record of any placings from 1st to 10th.

We arrived at the NEC in Birmingham and I introduced Bow to the venue to see how she reacted to the environment. It was extremely noisy and crowded, and Bow found this difficult to cope with. On the Saturday she was again fazed and by the time she went to compete she had completely lost her concentration and got stage-fright. Luckily, we were competing again at 10.15, and she performed much better then, despite the even larger audience.


The sport is very hard and does not have many competitors so despite Bow being a bit overawed, we managed to get two firsts. At the award ceremony, a tired and fidgety Bow decided to take this opportunity to leap at me and start a play fight in front of the whole audience and our fellow competitors; all the waiting around was far too boring!

For a nervous dog of two to qualify and perform as well as she did at Crufts is an amazing achievement and I cannot wait to compete when the season comes around again."









We have 44 Y10 students completing their Bronze D of E awards this year. Students have to learn a new skill, complete a physical activity and volunteer in the community. They must then complete a practice and an assessed hiking expedition, learning navigational skills, camp craft and improving their teamwork and communication skills.

The two day practice expedition through Otley and Bramhope was a great opportunity to develop the skills required for the assessed expedition from Ilkley to St Ives in June. Group 1 completed their final expedition on June 8th/9th and all passes. At the time of going to press Group 2 were still waiting to find out.

Doing D of E is a very rewarding experience, as achieving the Award gives students skills, confidence and a view on life that employers and universities are looking for. It helps students to develop their team work, leadership and commitment in a variety of activities, as well as making a difference in the community through their volunteering. Plus it's great fun! Although Bronze D of E does not contribute towards UCAS points, it does help when writing UCAS statements, due to the variety of skills and attributes it helps young people to achieve.



# Great at Debate

We have enjoyed success this year in terms of debating and speaking competitions.



Congratulations to Georgia Marker, Y13, who won the Leeds heat of the Historical Association 'Great Debate' competition and went to the National Final in March at the House of Lords.

Georgia's speech focused on the most democratic turning point in history with the event being held in London specifically to remember 100 years of Votes for Women. Georgia performed really well at the national event and finished runner up out of 23 finalists, winning £75 from Hodder education for the school history department and HA membership for herself, which will come in handy as Georgia currently holds an offer from Cambridge to study History.

In addition, three of our Y9 students; Elsa Beese, Christian Masiye and Fiona Trimby, won the district round of the Youth Speaks competition run by The Rotary Club. The team delivered a powerful and articulate speech on the UK government's role in animal welfare and the judges were particularly impressed by their use of challenging vocabulary, clear, confident diction and their teamwork.

This is the first time the school has entered a team and our pupils should have gone to the regional final in York but it was cancelled due to bad weather. Bring on next year!


Y12 BTEC Enterprise and Entrepreneurship students enjoyed some advice on how to get into law and how to set up your own business from current parent Claire Murphy.

## BRADFORD SPORTING AWARDS

We are very proud of pupils Harrison Green, Y12 and Hermione Roe, Y8, who were shortlisted for the Young Achievers Categories at the Bradford Sporting Awards in March. This was an amazing achievement for both students and credits their hard work and commitment to their chosen sport. They were invited to attend a glittering awards ceremony at Valley Parade where Harrison won Young Sportsman of the Year and Hermione came 2nd in her category.

Harrison was selected to represent the GB team in Bulgaria last year and has now been asked to compete in the Men's Senior events category despite still being a junior. In two recent qualifiers Harrison gained a 1st and 2nd place to qualify for the Men's Senior British Championships in September. He also smashed the World Age Group qualifying score by 10 points and this hopefully means he will represent his country again in Russia later in the year.





Hermione has had an incredible swim season with two national silver medals in 50m and 100m Breaststroke and two British Summer National qualifying times. Hermione has won 17 Swim England North East Regional Championships golds and 12 Yorkshire Championship golds and competed at the Senior Winter Nationals Championships/Commonwealth Games trials.

Hermione hopes to join City of Sheffield elite junior squad which means she will swim most days with Senior GB and National representatives as Sheffield is one of the top performance clubs in the country.






#### Triathlon

#### BATTLEFIELDS REPORT

- Bayernwald trenches, part of an original German trench system made in 1916.
- Essex Farm cemetery where we learned about the Canadian surgeon, John McCrae who, during the Second Battle of Ypres, wrote his famous poem 'In Flanders' Fields.'
- Langemark, a German cemetery with black gravestones and an open, mass grave that contains the remains of 24,917 servicemen.



- Passchendaele 1917 Memorial Museum where we went through underground model trenches with sound effects and realistic rooms that contained replicas of beds, toilets, offices and many more.
- Menin Gate Memorial, which bears 54,000 names of soldiers from the UK and Commonwealth who have no known grave. We stayed for the touching and poignant Last Post Ceremony and our school laid a wreath to commemorate the
- Wellington Quarry: we went underground and saw pictures and videos of the soldiers in action as well as objects such as uniforms which the soldiers had abandoned after the war had finished.
