



Mr Brian Greenwood

In July this year, we sadly said farewell to Mr Brian Greenwood. Mr Greenwood enjoyed a continuous association with Woodhouse Grove for more than 85 years. He was the youngest pupil ever to join the School upon the opening of Brontë House in 1934 and left the Grove in 1945, having been its longest serving pupil at that time – 11 years and one term.

Continued involvement with the school culminated in 1959, with an invitation to join the School's Board of Governors. From 1969 until 2009, Mr Greenwood was Chairman of Governors, and holds the distinction of being the longest serving Chairman of Governors to have held office in any Public School. Upon his retirement from the Board, Mr Greenwood became the School's very first Honorary President, a role he held for the rest of his remarkable life.

All of this was accomplished in parallel with an extremely active business career which embraced various industries both at home and in the U.S.A.

Mr Greenwood has dedicated many years to Woodhouse Grove, in many different roles and our thoughts and prayers are with Brian's family.

Y11 Sixth Form Experience Day



Recently there was much excitement and a grand unboxing of two new Lego Spike Prime sets that have replaced the venerable Mindstorms kits. Members of the club have just finished assembling them.

Now that the basic robots have been assembled, members will start to look at the different ways of programming them (e.g. Scratch, Python), then adding further functionality. The aim is to enter a team into the First Lego League which is a global competition.





Green Grove Riverbank

Students involved in the Green Grove Riverbank project have been working hard this term and have cleared a significant amount of the invasive Himalayan Balsam weed. The student pioneers learned about the damage Himalayan Balsam does to the riverbanks and how to remove it. The Tesco Community Grant that has been awarded for this project will help to fund more beneficial planting on the riverbank, such as willow and fruit trees, which can improve natural flood resistance.

Reach for the Stars

Climbing club has been a storming success this year, with junior climbers turning up each week to learn about belaying, rope work and foot technique on the wall, or simply enjoying climbing games such as fruit ninja, limbo and shark attack! Our regular members are steadily working their way through each climb, ticking them off only once they can climb it without falling. Despite a few nerves at first, everyone is now able to get to the top. The club has been so successful, we've expanded to another night for juniors!

First Class Honours

This 6 month programme provides students with the opportunity to meet inspiring female leaders working at some of the UK's biggest companies, and connect with female mentors from top STEM organisations.



Medical Leavers

We caught up with a couple of Old Grovians who recently graduated with medical degrees to find out about their University experiences.

Aaron Soane, Grovian 2008 -15, went to the University of Manchester to study medicine. He kindly came in to school this term and hosted a Q&A session for students considering a career in medicine.



Why did you choose this course and did you enjoy it?

I enjoyed science at school and I've always enjoyed interacting with people. I also wanted a job that would allow me to have a positive impact on people's lives. Combining these led to being a doctor.

The course surpassed my expectations with a wide range of tutorials and skills sessions in my weekly timetable, ranging from anatomy and full body cadaver dissection to pharmacology and communication skills.

What area of medicine are you studying at present?

I'm currently in the second of my two foundation years of being a junior doctor, rotating specialties every 4 months. I'm currently working in palliative care, looking after patients who may be approaching the end of their lives.

What do you particularly enjoy about your job?

I feel privileged to be able to look after people when they're at their most vulnerable. Being able to assess, diagnose and treat patients' illnesses is really rewarding. From prescribing pain relief to performing procedures, you never stop learning new skills or improving existing ones.

What have been the biggest challenges?

Covid has been a huge struggle. I opted to graduate early so that I could work on the front line at Manchester Royal Infirmary during the first wave of covid and since then I've only ever worked in the NHS whilst there's been an ongoing pandemic. Increased shifts, staff sickness, limited resources and dealing frequently with worst case scenarios have been massive obstacles for a newly-qualified doctor.

Would you recommend your career to students?

Absolutely. It's a tough job but every career has its challenges. The satisfaction I get from coming home at the end of the day and knowing I've made a difference to someone's life is a feeling like no other. Medicine is also a massively diverse field to work in; your day-to-day job can range from being a neurosurgeon operating in theatres, to being a psychiatrist treating mental health illnesses.

What did you learn from the Grove which is benefitting you now?

Confidence in my own abilities; teachers and boarding staff always encouraged me to improve and try new things, both in and out of the classroom. The social skills I developed at school have helped carry me through all aspects of my life; from making friends at uni to working with senior consultants.

Natasha Whitcombe, Grovian 2013 - 16, retook one A-level at the Grove after just missing out on her first year of application. She then went on to study dentistry at the University of Manchester.

Why did you choose dentistry?

When I finished my GCSE's I knew I wanted to do something in the medical field, but wasn't sure medicine was quite the right fit for me. I considered several healthcare careers, but none really sparked that interest. Through my own dental experiences I understood the value of being given your smile back, and I liked that it was a career that offers continual opportunity for specialisation across a broad field.



Was it what you expected? If not, how did it differ from your perceptions when you left school?

I was surprised by how much full body anatomy you need to know as a Dentist, it isn't just the head and neck! Many systemic conditions impact the mouth and alter the manner in which dental treatment can be carried out. You need a broad understanding of bodily systems (e.g. liver and kidney function, respiratory function etc) to safely plan treatment and avoid complications.

What do you particularly enjoy about your job?

I find paediatric dentistry really fun and rewarding, so one of my favourite parts of the job is treating children. I also really enjoy helping anxious patients access care.

What have been the biggest challenges so far?

At the beginning I was frustrated by the challenge of learning new areas, and had to dig deep to find the confidence and self belief to get through. It is really refreshing to look back at subject areas that were once challenging, but now the terminology and content are a normal part of my everyday vocabulary and knowledge.

Would you recommend your career to current students?

Yes, absolutely! I think one of the most valuable pieces of advice is to give yourself the space to learn. The courses are very competitive, and you may face set backs that you are perhaps not used to. Try not to get disheartened or frustrated if you find things challenging. A little resilience goes a long way!

What did you learn from the Grove, which is benefitting you now?

When I decided to resit one of my subjects and re-apply to Dentistry, the staff at The Grove went above and beyond to support me to achieve my goal. I had the determination to try again, but the effort put in by members of staff to help me, is what taught me perseverance and resilience. The skills I learnt at WGS, equipped me to study Dentistry, but also helped me to cope with pressures beyond academia.

What is your role?

What is your Sixth Form café order?

Cornish Cross Country Capers

The Grove's cross-country squad made school history this term when all four teams qualified for the National Final of the English School's Athletics Association's cross-country Cup. At the beginning of December, the squad enjoyed a three-day trip to Newquay, Cornwall.

The long journey did not quell their enthusiasm. George felt that one of the highlights of her trip was "bonding with the other Grove squads and getting to know them better", and the long coach rides allowed plenty of opportunity for them to do this. We stayed in the Blue Room Surf Lodge, Newquay and several of the junior girls made light work of their steak and chips on the first night. Tife and Cleo agreed that "the food was definitely one of the best parts of the trip!". Breakfasts and pack lunches were prepared by TV chef and sports nutritionist, Rosie Mansfield.

As this was a national final, the course itself was a challenging one, with steep hills and sharp corners; William said that "all the hill training we did beforehand really helped in the race".

The first race was the Inter girls, who ran in a rare glimpse of sunshine. Maisey Bellwood went out hard and worked her way up the pack, finishing in an incredible second place. She was followed by her teammates, club captain Eilidh Molloy, George Rayner, Gaelle Carrasco, Alyse Warburton and Jenny Ingham.

Next up were the Junior boys, who raced hard, but were surprised by the very fast start; James McClarnon was our first junior over the finish line in 51st place. He was followed by Rafe McCormack, Simeon Tedd, Ollie Hall, William Thornhill and Henry Shimmin. Simeon said "the course was really difficult, and we learnt that, next time, we'll have to push our way through the pack at the very start to get those high positions."

Next was the Inter boys' race, and, added to the high winds that had already made running difficult that day, were horizontal hail stones! Archie Peaker, who finished 9th, remarked that "the hail stones were the hardest part of the race – they pelted your face and eyes, but we just had to push through it". The pursuing Inter boys were captain Harry Bates, Ethan Taylor, Zach Taylor, Ayomide Solaru and Jacob Best.

The last race of the day was the Junior girls' race: Macie Donaldson was followed by, Charley Clark-Taylor, Harriet Williams, Cleo Hainsworth, Tife Solaru and Georgie Cothliff. The conditions under-foot were hard for these girls: five races' worth of runners had churned the ground up. Georgie said that "by the time Junior girls raced, the course was slick with mud. Even with 12mm spikes, we had to scramble up the hills". Overall, the Inter girls finished in 16th, Junior boys 18th, Inter boys 19th and Junior girls 27th. The celebratory meal at Pizza Express that evening was well deserved and thoroughly enjoyed.



On Sunday, the squad enjoyed an early jog down to the beach just after sunrise. They played on the beach, jumped in the waves and did a little barefoot jogging on the sand before the long coach ride home. As staff, we are so proud of them for reaching the national final and for running so hard on a tough course, battling their way to the finish. This is such a promising set of young athletes with a bright future ahead of them; 17 of the 24 were making their debut this season.

Fencing

With its reintroduction to the school last year, the fencing club has grown from strength to strength and an average of 30 pupils attend each week from Years 7, 8 and 9. Our first target tournament is The Yorkshire County Championships on 26th February. Three pupils also attended an extra training session held by the Northern Sports Academy Fencing Club over half term and trained with University of Leeds and Harrogate fencing club.

Our Year 8 and 9 fencers benefit from the support and advice from Kira Grahamslaw, Year 10, who recently competed at the Cadet Epee tournament in Serbia. Kira tells us a little about this experience.

What was it like fencing for GB?

I was so excited to be selected to compete for the GB Cadet Epee squad as it meant I had earned my GB stripes at only 14 years old in an U17 age group. I was quite nervous as I knew I'd be competing in my biggest competition yet with more than 340 fencers from over 20 countries; I was the only GB fencer from the north of England!

In the first round, I fenced girls from Serbia, Russia, Greece, Switzerland and Hungary – the girl from Greece was really friendly and spoke very good English. Before round two, they eliminated the bottom 25% of fencers – none of the younger fencers made the cut, including me! So I supported the other GB fencers for the rest of the day.

My coaches in Manchester were really pleased that I had scored good points in almost every match. If I had scored just three more points, I might have made the cut – that will be my aim next time. I am currently ranked 24th in the Great Britain cadet epee rankings but I'm hoping to increase that back to the top 20 in the next few ranking competitions which will mean I am selected to fence internationally again.

It was pizza and pyjamas all the way at the end of November – lots of fun organised by the Ashdown Brontë Association (ABA).


Pre-Nursery and Nursery enjoyed the day in their pyjamas. They baked, made crowns, played special outdoor games and ate a delicious pizza lunch.

Outdoor Playground

Back in 2019, the ABA approached the School to request a major project to invest in that would benefit all children within the school. School Council representatives discussed this with their classes and the children voted to improve the playground provision. The current adventure playground has been in place for 12 years and requires significant attention. The decision was made to fundraise for a new structure, combined with a weatherproof safety surface, that would enable Years 1 to 6 to play all-year-round.

Phase one of the development is the large piece of equipment shown above. This will be placed in the central grass area and is planned for February 2022. Phase two will focus on the area that currently contains the storyteller's chair and trim trail equipment and may incorporate additional covered seating areas for those children who prefer to sit and chat with friends at playtimes.

We are incredibly fortunate at Brontë House to benefit from a highly supportive parental body and a group of volunteers who give so tirelessly of their time. The new playground is the result of the hard work of ABA members past and present over a number of years, and we can't wait to see the finished result.

We have been delighted by the levels of engagement from students in our inclusive and varied Games and after-school co-curricular sport programme this term. Activities have included rugby, netball, swimming, cross-country, box-fit, hockey and multi-sport.

We have also welcomed the return of inter-school fixtures to Brontë House for Years 3 to 6. This has enabled all students to be provided with the opportunity to represent the school in a competitive fixture in rugby and netball. Rugby and netball continue to be our main Autumn term sports and have provided our students with a large number of fixtures and festivals, including;

Brontë Clubs

Languages

Science & Technology

STEM clubs have been set some engineering challenges over the last few weeks;

Coding club, Years 5 and 6, created their own racing games. They designed and created characters and backgrounds and are programming their characters to move.


Creative


Sewing club helps our youngest children to develop the skills of patience and persistence. Many of them mastered mastered the up and down action of sewing and were ready to move onto binca fabric.

Nursery have also been talking about what makes a good friend and Pre-Nursery joined in wearing odd socks to celebrate what makes us unique.






New Kitchen
